# Knights of Columbus Sets New Records for Charitable Contributions



Knights Donate \$151 Million and 69 Million Service Hours The Knights of Columbus announced that it set new all-time records for charitable donations and volunteer service hours in 2009.

Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson released the results of the Catholic fraternal organization's annual survey in a presentation to its board of directors and state leaders, meeting at its international headquarters.

The results of the Knights' annual Survey of Fraternal Activity for the year ending December 31, 2009, indicate that total charitable contributions reached \$151,105,867 – exceeding the previous year's total by more than \$1 million.

The figure includes \$34,627,530 donated by the Supreme Council, and \$116,477,971 in contributions

from the organization's state and local affiliates.

The survey also indicated that the quantity of volunteer service hours to charitable causes by Knights grew to 69,251,926 – an increase of 468,291 hours compared to the 2008 total. There were more than 413,000 Knights of Columbus blood donations during the year and, among the most common service programs, Habitat for Humanity received 227,900 K of C volunteer hours.

Cumulative figures show that during the past decade, the Knights of Columbus has donated more than \$1.367 billion to charity, and provided nearly 640 million hours of volunteer service in support of charitable initiatives.

The Arlington Diocese supports the Diocese of San Juan de La Maguana in the Dominican Republic by providing two priests there (one priest in Bánica and one priest in the neighboring town of Pedro Santana). **Fr. Rooney, our past chaplain, served there.** Currently **Rev Keith O'Hare, a member of our council** 

#### serves there.

Public education in the Dominican Republic is in a pitiful state. The education system is run by politicians who often hand out teaching jobs as prizes and not based on merit. The result is that many children are not even learning to read. Therefore in 2004, Father Dan Gee of the Diocese of Arlington, established a parochial school in the town of Bánica. It currently has over 200 students in pre-kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade Families pay 100 pesos (\$3 US) per student per month for tuition. However, the actual cost is \$30 per month. The average daily wage for a farmer there is \$9/day. Thus families can't afford to pay more.

Therefore, last year, the Grand Knight has approved establishing a Bánica scholarship in the amount of \$300 to support one child. This will not be a line item in the council budget. Rather than having a fund raiser, we are looking for 10 Knights to each donate \$30. Last year the council raised over \$530. We hope to meet or exceed that this year. Those interested in helping should send a check to *AI Botticelli (3830 Farr Oak Circle, Fairfax, VA 22030)* who will consolidate them. We hope to meet our goal by 15 August.

# The Catholic spirit of knighthood

I had the pleasure last week of spending time with Suzanne and Jim Broski. Like thousands of other Catholic married couples, the Broski's have a longtime love of their faith and devotion to the work of the Church. What makes their circumstances unique though is this: The Broski's are Colorado's new state "co-councilors" for the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem, better known as the Knights of the Holy Sepulcher. They had come to introduce themselves, and also to outline the Knights, good work in easing the plight of Christians in the Holy Land.

Knighthood is an institution with very deep roots in the memory of the Church. Nearly 900 years ago, the great St. Bernard of Clairvaux described the ideal Christian knights as Godly men who "shun every excess in clothing and food. They live as brothers in joyful and sober company (with) one heart and one soul. There is no distinction of persons among them, and deference is shown to merit rather than to noble blood. They rival one another in mutual consideration, and they carry one another's burdens, thus fulfilling the law of Christ."

Bernard was anything but naive. Writing in the early 12th century, he was well aware of the greed, vanity and violence that too often motivated Europe's warrior class, even in the name of religious faith. Yet he wrote at a time when large Christian populations still existed in the Middle East and suffered under Muslim armed conquest, discrimination and persecution. In fact a trigger for the medieval Crusades, which began in Bernard's lifetime, had been the harassment of Christian pilgrims to holy sites in what we now know as Israel and Palestine.

Many of the Crusaders who rallied to the liberation of the Holy Land did so out of genuine zeal for the Cross. Europe in the Middle Ages was a continent where Christian faith animated every aspect of daily life. But Bernard also knew that many others who left for the Crusade had mixed or even ugly motives. In his great essay "In Praise of the New Knighthood" (c. 1136), he outlined the virtues that should shape the vocation of every truly "Christian" knight: humility, austerity, justice, obedience, unselfishness and a single-minded zeal for lesus Christ in defending the Church, the poor and the weak.

Life today may seem very different from life in the 12th century, but human nature (our basic hopes, dreams, anxieties and sufferings) hasn't really changed. The Christian vocation remains the same: to follow Jesus Christ faithfully, and in following Jesus, to defend Christ's Church and serve her people zealously, unselfishly and with

all our skill. As St. Ignatius Loyola wrote in his "Spiritual Exercises" (and remember that Ignatius himself was a former soldier) each of us must choose between two battle standards: the standard of Jesus Christ, humanity's true King, or the standard of his impostor, the Prince of This World. There is no neutral ground.

Here's my point: The Church needs men and women of courage and Godliness today more than at any time in her history; and this is why the Catholic ideal of knighthood, with its demands of radical discipleship, is still vividly alive and still urgently needed. Whether one belongs to a wonderful fraternal service order like the Knights of Columbus or the Knights of St. Peter Claver; to an historic knightly order like the Knights of the Holy Sepulcher or the Knights of Malta; or to one of the Holy See's own pontifical knightly orders like the Knights of St. Gregory the Great; the essence of knighthood is the same: sacrificial service rooted in a living Catholic faith.

That spirit of knighthood is available to all of us. It's a vocation every Christian was made for. And it will never go out of style.

# Fraternal Benefits Advisor Message

#### 'Right to Apply' helps widows in need

The laws and rules of our Order, as well as state laws, specify that the Knights of Columbus may accept insurance applications only from Knights of Columbus members. As a member, you may apply for insurance on yourself, your wife and your dependent, minor children.

The Order's Board of Directors has taken action, though, to assure that a brother Knight's widow maintains the right to purchase additional insurance for a limited time. This can be of great benefit and comfort to those we leave behind.

This "right to apply" is available only to the widows of insured members. If a member has not availed himself of our top-rated life insurance program, or purchased an annuity or long-term care policy, this benefit is not available to his widow.



But if the Knight was an insured member, his widow has the right to apply for additional insurance on her life and on the lives of the member's minor children. This right can be exercised for up to one year following the Order's receipt of proof of the insured's death.

Know two things. First, I'll assist your widow and children in any way possible if you should die, both with your Knights of Columbus insurance and any other life insurance you may have. Second, I'll provide them my best professional advice and service to ensure that they continue to have adequate insurance protection.
