In addition, I would like to thank all the Knights and other volunteers who helped defray the cost of putting on the March for Life January 24 by both collecting donations from those who marched and counting the donations afterward. The 2010 March for Life was a record year for collections, and unfortunately, we could not match that in 2011 due to several factors, including location. In my opinion, the width of

the March area where we collected had a large impact on the total amount collected (about \$18,000 this year). This emphasizes the number of collectors needed for this effort. There is a direct correlation between the number of volunteers for collecting and the amount collected, especially in a wide March area. With hope and prayers, perhaps there will not be a need for a 2012 March for Life. If there is a March, however, I encourage those who can help to do so.

Please help me specifically thank **January's** Family of the Month for all of their outstanding efforts: Marianne and Allan Botticelli. Marianne and Al are included in the "thank-yous" above for their efforts at counting and taking care of March for Life donations. In addition, Al provided excellent service as Financial Secretary, coordinated the sign-in efforts at the Third Degree on 1/29, offered welcome advice to the Grand Knight on specific activities, and assisted with the Family Breakfast on 1/23, along with his sons Thomas and Christopher (who also helped with the Third Degree sign-in). In addition, their family had a hand in producing the drawings used in the display of Providence Hall renovations that has been in the vestibule at St. Leo's. Many thanks to the whole (extended) family!

January's Knight of the Month, John Judge, is an amazing individual.
