Fraternal Benefits Advisor Message

Only having "through work" insurance doesn't work

Do you know anyone whose life has been drastically changed by the recent recession and economic downturn? Earthquake and Hurricane Irene—Minimal Damage to Providence Hall

When we rededicated the newly renovated Providence Hall we never thought it would come under attack by "Mother Nature" as severely as it has this year. On August 23 we experienced the largest earthquake since the 5.8 quake in 1897 (in south west Virginia). Five days later we were threatened by Category-I Hurricane Irene, which narrowly missed the Fairfax area but did severe damage with wind, rain and tornados to the entire

Atlantic Coast of the United States. We had severe rain and high winds (over 50MPH). Providence Hall faired well from the Hurricane but the earthquake did some damage to the ceiling (see pictures). All damage has been repaired.
